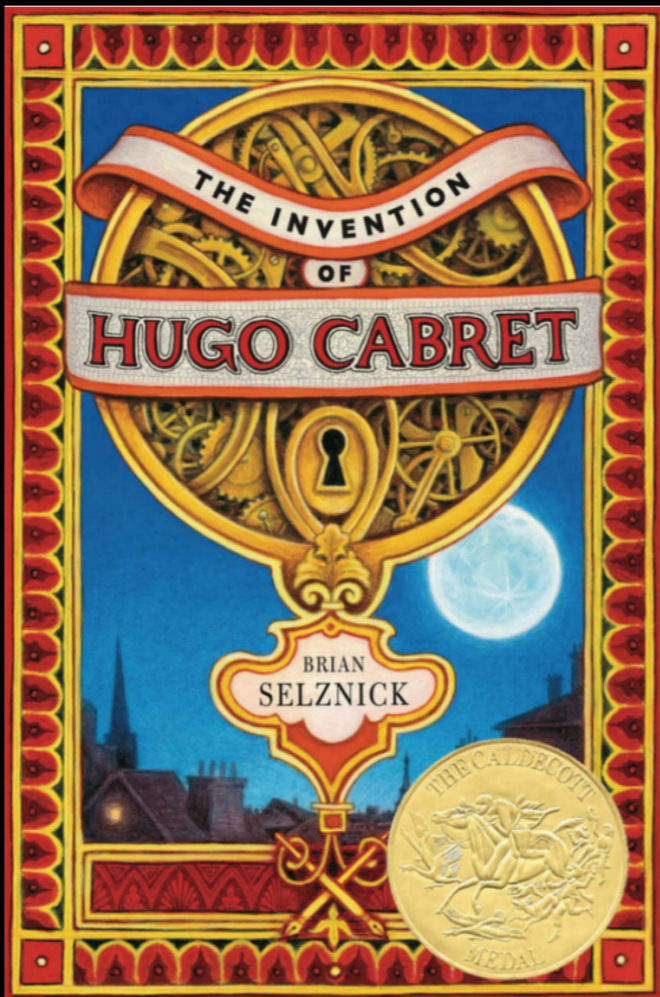

Last week, we made notes to help us with writing a narrative in which Uncle Claude teaches Hugo how to steal.

Task: Write a piece of narrative in which Uncle Claude teaches Hugo how to steal. In doing so, reveal details about how Claude moves and looks, and use speech punctuation correctly.

Find the answers to the questions below and make notes

- Where were they when this took place? And what key details might we mention?
- Why did Claude teach Hugo steal?
- What tips did he give him?
- Why did Hugo not want to steal?
- What is their relationship like? And how do they interact with one another?

Task: Write a piece of narrative in which Uncle Claude teaches Hugo how to steal. In doing so, reveal details about how Claude moves and looks, and use speech punctuation correctly.

For your narrative, you need to set the scene first and help the reader to imagine what is happening. To do this, you need to make sure your descriptions are detailed.

On the next slide is an introduction and the start of the narrative in which Uncle Claude teaches Hugo to steal.

It was exactly a month after the fire when Claude began to teach his nephew how to steal.

Hugo's daydreams about life as a magician were rudely interrupted by the return of Claude to their apartment. Barging through the door, somewhat unstable on his feet, Claude announced, "Hugo, it is time. It is time for you to start providing for us. Otherwise, I fear we will not survive."



Now it's your turn to write your own narrative.

Use expanded noun phrases, adverbials and preposition phrases to express complicated information concisely and to add detail.
