


Read Chapter 6 and come back to this lesson.

Before we write the narrative, it is essential we explore answer some questions.




Papa George still has your notebook.

- Why is she telling Hugo this information?


On the next few sides are some images (stills from the film and images from the book).

Task: Write the section of narrative where Hugo meets the girl in the bookstore.










What impressions of the bookstore do we have? Why?
