



A lot of the language would be accessible to children of those ages, but there are some words that would need to be looked up (sombre, ambled, faltered, etc.) making it suitably challenging book.



Children younger than 9 may find this a bit too distressing and it is too mature a story for them to understand and enjoy, whereas 9-12 year olds will be old enough to understand the story and the action is suitable for them.




Read and analyse both - think about your first impressions of who the intended audience may be base on the style and content.





We deal with all kinds of power in this world. There is personal power — the power we have (or don't) in our day-to-day lives and the choices we make for ourselves.
