
















What is censorship?

A biased person favours one side or issue over another.

While biased can just mean having a preference for one thing over another, it is also synonymous with "prejudiced" and that prejudice can be taken to the extreme. Sometimes a person is so biased or is leaning so far in one direction that it's hard to see the other position, creating unfairness in an argument or decision. Often though, it's just more lightly.


